ACCOMMODATIONS and MODIFICATIONS

Satisfy requirements as written



ACCOMMODATIONS

- Assisting with a task
- NOT changing the task required
- Providing additional supports in order to help the Scout achieve their goal

MODIFICATIONS

- Changes the requirement
 - Reduces the requirement or
 - Substitutes it for something else

WHAT KIND OF ACCOMMODATIONS CAN BE USED?

- Timing
- Scheduling
- Setting
- Presentation
- Response



TIMING

- → Scout requires more time to read, write, use devices
 - May require electronic devices or assistance to stay on task
 - Allow to complete in small chunks

SCHEDULING

- → Coordination with the effects of medication
 - Schedule task when medication is at its most effective
 - Provide frequent breaks

SETTING

- → Scout has difficulty focusing in a group setting, distracting other youths
 - Personal assistance including supervision and cues
 - Preferential seating, etc.

PRESENTATION

- → Scout has specific sensory needs
 - Change the group size
 - Determine the rate of new skill introduction
 - ◆ Teach prerequisites
 - Provide visual/auditory cue cards
 - Adapt existing materials

RESPONSE

- → Scout has a sensory or physical disability their limits their ability to respond, memorize, etc.
 - Allow Scout record answers (scribe), respond orally, uses assistive technology, etc.

MODIFICATIONS



CANNOT CHANGE REQUIREMENTS FOR ANY MERIT BADGE

- If it says "show" or "demonstrate", that is what they have to do
- But think outside the box to meet the requirements

Alternate Scout, Tenderfoot, Second Class or First Class Requirements

A Scout who has been designated as having a disability may request changes:

- Tenderfoot, Second Class, and First Class ranks
- Full guidelines and procedures are described in:
 - Current Scouts-BSA Alternative Requirements for Scout, Tenderfoot, Second Class or First Class Rank
 - Then, an Individual Scout Advancement Plan (pub# 512-936) should be filed with your Council's Advancement Committee for review and approval.

Alternative Eagle Merit Badges

A Scout with a permanent physical or mental disability may select an alternative merit badge in lieu of a required merit badge if the disabling condition prohibits the Scout from completing the necessary requirements of a particular required merit badge.

- This substitute should provide a "similar learning experience."
